September 11, 2001

Twenty-fifth Anniversary

Tuesday, September 11, 2001, dawned as a beautiful late summer day over New York City. Then, within an hour and fifteen minutes that tragic morning, life as we knew it ended.

World Trade Center

On September 11, 2001, at 8:46 a.m., an American Airlines Boeing 767 loaded with 20,000 gallons of jet fuel crashed into the north tower of the World Trade Center.

The impact left a gaping, burning hole near the 93rd and 99th floors of the 110-story skyscraper, instantly killing hundreds of people and trapping hundreds more on higher floors.

As the evacuation of the tower and its twin got underway, television cameras broadcasted live images of what initially appeared to be a freak accident. Accidents do happen. On Saturday, July 28, 1945, Lieutenant Colonel William Franklin Smith Jr., was piloting a B-25 Mitchell bomber on a routine personnel transport mission from Bedford Army Airfield in Massachusetts. Thick fog prevented the aircraft from landing at LaGuardia Airport as scheduled. The pilot requested to divert to Newark Metropolitan Airport in New Jersey. Lt Col Smith was advised of zero visibility. Proceeding anyway, he became disoriented by the fog and turned right instead of left after flying dangerously close to the Chrysler Building on East 42nd Street.

At 9:40 a.m., the aircraft crashed into the north side of the Empire State Building between the 78th and 80th floors, into the offices of the War Relief Services and the National Catholic Welfare Council. Fourteen people were killed in this accidental crash.

Then, 18 minutes after the first plane hit the north tower of the World Trade Center, a second Boeing 767—United Airlines Flight 175—appeared in the sky, sharply turned toward the World Trade Center, and sliced into the south tower between the 77th and 85th floors. This was no accident – this was a deliberate attack on the United States.

From where Did these Four Planes Take Off?

The 19 terrorists smuggled box-cutters and knives through security at three East Coast airports—Logan International Airport in Boston, Dulles International Airport in Washington, D.C., and Newark International Airport in New Jersey—and boarded four early-morning flights bound for California, chosen because the planes were loaded with fuel for the long trans-continental journey. Soon after take-off, the terrorists commandeered the four planes and took the controls, transforming ordinary passenger jets into guided missiles.

Pentagon Attack

As millions watched the events unfolding in New York, American Airlines Flight 77 circled over down-town Washington, D.C., before crashing into the west side of the Pentagon Military Headquarters at 9:37 a.m.

Jet fuel from the Boeing 757 caused a devastating inferno that led to the structural collapse of a portion of the giant concrete building, which is the headquarters of the U.S. Department of Defense.

All total, 125 military personnel and civilians were killed in the Pentagon, along with all 64 people aboard the airliner.

Twin Towers Collapse

Less than 15 minutes after the terrorists struck the nerve center of the U.S. Military, the horror in New York took a catastrophic turn when the south tower of the World Trade Center collapsed in a massive cloud of dust and smoke.

The structural steel of the skyscraper, built to withstand winds in excess of 200 miles per hour and a large conventional fire, could not withstand the tremendous heat generated by the burning jet fuel.

At 10:28 a.m., the north building of the twin towers collapsed. Only 18 people in the World Trade Center towers at the time of the collapse survived. Most were with a group of FDNY firefighters in the North Tower's Stairwell B, which remained intact. One woman survived after the stairs she was rushing down disintegrated around her. Almost 10,000 others were treated for injuries, many severe.

Flight 93

Meanwhile, a fourth California-bound plane—United Flight 93—was hijacked about 40 minutes after leaving Newark Liberty International Airport in New Jersey. Because the plane had been delayed taking off, passengers on board learned of events in New York and Washington via cell phone and Airfone calls to the ground.

Knowing that the aircraft was not returning to an airport as the hijackers claimed, a group of passengers and flight attendants planned an insurrection.

One of the passengers, Thomas Burnett, Jr., told his wife over the phone that *"I know we're all going to die. There's three of us who are going to do something about it. I love you, honey."* Another passenger—Todd Beamer—was heard saying *"Are you guys ready? Let's roll!"* over an open line.

Sandy Bradshaw, a flight attendant, called her husband and explained that she had slipped into a galley and was filling pitchers with boiling water. Her last words to him were *"Everyone's running to first class. I've got to go. Bye."*

The passengers fought the four hijackers and are suspected of having attacked the cockpit with a fire extinguisher. The plane then flipped over and sped toward the ground at upwards of 500 miles per hour, crashing into a rural field near Shanksville in western Pennsylvania at 10:02 a.m.

All 44 people aboard were killed. Its intended target is not known, but high on the theory list are the White House and the U.S. Capitol.

Twenty-fifth Anniversary

How Many People Died in the 9/11 Attacks?

A total of 2,996 people were killed in the September 11th attacks, including the 19 terrorist hijackers aboard the four airplanes. Citizens 78 countries died in New York, Washington, D.C., and Pennsylvania.

At the World Trade Center, 2,763 died after the two planes slammed into the twin towers. That figure includes 343 firefighters and paramedics, 23 New York City police officers, and 37 Port Authority police officers who were struggling to complete an evacuation of the buildings and save the office workers trapped on higher floors.

At the Pentagon, 189 people were killed, including 64 on AA Flight 77, the airliner that struck the building. On UA Flight 93, 44 people died when the plane crash-landed in Pennsylvania.

U.S. Airspace Closed

At 9:45 am, an hour after the first hijacked plane collided with the North Tower of the World Trade Center in New York, a complete closure of the North American airspace was ordered. This was the first time in history that the American, as well as the Canadian airspaces, were closed. Domestic flights were ordered to land at the nearest airport. But, what to do with in-bound international flights. At that time, the first west-bound transatlantic flights were starting to enter the Canadian and American airspaces and did not have enough fuel to return to Europe.

Canadian Response and Assistance

Canada, our long-time friend and peaceful neighbor, inaugurated Operation Yellow Ribbon to handle the diversion of civilian airline flights in response to the September 11th attacks. Canada's goal was to ensure that potentially destructive air traffic be removed from United States airspace as quickly as possible, and away from potential U.S. targets and to instead place these aircraft on the ground in Canada, at military and civilian airports primarily in the provinces of Nova Scotia, Newfoundland and British Columbia.

Yukon, New Brunswick, Alberta, Manitoba, and Quebec also took aircraft. None of the aircraft proved to be a threat, and Canada hosted thousands of passengers who were stranded until U.S. airspace was reopened.

During Operation Yellow Ribbon, departing flights—with the exception of police, military, and humanitarian flights—were cancelled, marking the first time that Canadian airspace had been shut down. In total, as a result of Operation Yellow Ribbon, between 225 and 240 aircraft were diverted to 17 different airports across Canada.

Just one example of Canadian help and hospitality, 38 U.S. bound incoming flights landed at Gander International Airport in Newfoundland. The tiny town of Gander had a population of less than 10,000 people. That population nearly doubled within a few hours as 38 airplanes carrying almost 7,000 passengers and crew members landed in Gander with no idea as to when their flights could depart.

On September 11, 2002, Prime Minister Jean Chretien visited Gander to pay tribute to the small community. He praised their generosity in pointing out that the people of Gander immediately opened their food pantries and linen closets, and homes to feed and shelter their unexpected visitors. The Prime Minister captured the kindness of the people of Gander as he applied this adage to them, *"In Gander, a stranger is someone you have not yet met"*.

It is an introduction to the Catholic understanding of GOD and creation and to the relationship into which GOD invites each of us, both with the LORD JESUS and with one another.

Adult Catholics who have not yet received the Sacrament of Confirmation or who simply want to learn more about their faith may also benefit from participating in OCIA.
